

Week 5: Sowing Worship...Drawing Attention To The One Who Most Deserves It

What have we been talking about SOWING lately?

- Week 1: Sowing Time...The Key Is Not How You Spend It, But How You Invest It. We will harvest understanding!
- Week 2: Sowing Money...Who's Ruling Who. We will harvest influence!
- Week 3: Sowing Peace...God's Bomb Squad. We will harvest courage!
- Week 4: Sowing Friendship...Getting Your Fingers In Each Others Clay. We will harvest trust!
- Week 5: Sowing worship...Drawing Attention To The One Who Most Deserves It. We will harvest humility!
 - How do you "sow" worship into God's kingdom? Does it mean that we are we supposed to be singing the songs we sing when we gather together on Sundays *outside* the four walls of the church? Is that what it means to sow worship?
 - Actually, it is something quite different. Let's look again at one of the <u>anchor scriptures</u> regarding sowing into the kingdom of God...
 - ⁷ Don't be misled—you cannot mock the justice of God. You will always harvest what you plant. ⁸ Those who live only to satisfy their own sinful nature will harvest decay and death from that sinful nature. But those who live to please the Spirit will harvest everlasting life from the Spirit. ⁹ So let's not get tired of doing what is good. At just the right time we will reap a harvest of blessing if we don't give up. ¹⁰ Therefore, whenever we have the opportunity, we should do good to everyone—especially to those in the family of faith. (Gal 6:7–10 NLT-SE)
 - What are we really planting? When we talk about God, what words do we use? When we want to open the door for someone to get closer to God, what is it that we are encouraging them to do? Repent? Go to church? What are we attempting to draw them to, a church, a leader, or to God Himself? Here are two scriptural references that might get us thinking...
 - The source of revelation-knowledge is found as you fall down in surrender before the Lord. **Don't expect to see Shekinah glory until the Lord sees your sincere humility.** (Prov 15:33 Passion)
 - ²¹ I pray for them all to be **joined together as one**, even as you and I, Father, are joined together as one, I pray **for them to become one with us** so that the world will recognize that you sent me. ²² For the very glory you have given to me I have given them, so that they will be **joined together as one and experience the same unity that we enjoy**. ²³ You live fully in me and now I live fully in them so that **they will experience perfect unity**, and <u>the world will be convinced</u> that you have sent me, for they will see that you love each one of them with the same passionate love that you have for me. (John 17:21-23 Passion)

- "What comes into our minds when we think about God is the most important thing about us... Worship is pure or base as the worshiper entertains high or low thoughts of God... The gravest question before the Church is always God Himself, and the most portentous (something done in a religious manner so as to impress) fact about any man is not what he at a given time may say or do, but what he in his deep heart conceives God to be like." ~ A.W. Tozer, The Knowledge of the Holy
- ¹ And so, dear brothers and sisters, I plead with you to give your bodies to God because of all he has done for you. Let them be a living and holy sacrifice—the kind he will find acceptable. This is truly the way to worship him. ² Don't copy the behavior and customs of this world, but **let God transform you into a new person by changing the way you think.** Then you will learn to know God's will for you, which is good and pleasing and perfect. (Rom 12:1–2 NLT-SE)

THREE PERSPECTIVES ON WORSHIP

- He who was (Is 6:1-5), and is (John 3:26-34), and is to come (Rev 4:1-11, "on earth as it is in heaven").
 - "I am the Alpha and the Omega—the beginning and the end," says the Lord God. "I am the one who is, who always was, and who is still to come—the Almighty One."...¹⁷ When I saw him, I fell at his feet as if I were dead. But he laid his right hand on me and said, "Don't be afraid! I am the First and the Last. ¹⁸ I am the living one. I died, but look—I am alive forever and ever! And I hold the keys of death and the grave. (Rev 1:8, 17–18 NLT-SE)
 - **He who was...**¹ It was in the year King Uzziah died that I saw the Lord. He was sitting on a lofty throne, and the train of his robe filled the Temple. ² Attending him were mighty seraphim, each having six wings. With two wings they covered their faces, with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. ³ They were calling out to each other, "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of Heaven's Armies! The whole earth is filled with his glory!"
 - ⁴ Their voices shook the Temple to its foundations, and the entire building was filled with smoke. ⁵ Then I said, "It's all over! I am doomed, for I am a sinful man. I have filthy lips, and I live among a people with filthy lips. Yet I have seen the King, the Lord of Heaven's Armies." (Is 6:1–5 NLT-SE)
 - And is...²⁶ John's disciples came to him and said, "Rabbi, the man you met on the other side of the Jordan River, the one you identified as the Messiah, is also baptizing people. And everybody is going to him instead of coming to us."
 - ²⁷ John replied, "No one can receive anything unless God gives it from heaven. ²⁸ You yourselves know how plainly I told you, 'I am not the Messiah. I am only here to prepare the way for him.' ²⁹ It is the bridegroom who marries the bride, and the best man is simply glad to stand with him and hear his vows. Therefore, I am filled with joy at his success. ³⁰ **He must become greater and greater, and I must become less and less** ("he is destined to become greater, and I must be pruned." Passion Translation).
 - ³¹ "He has come from above and is greater than anyone else. We are of the earth, and we speak of earthly things, but he has come from heaven and is greater than anyone else. ³² He testifies about what he has seen and heard, but how few believe what he tells them! ³³ Anyone who accepts his testimony can affirm that God is true. ³⁴ For he is sent by God. He speaks God's words, for God gives him the Spirit without limit. (John 3:26–34 NLT-SE)

page - 2 Week 5: Sowing Worship

- And is to come...¹ I saw a door standing open in heaven, and the same voice I had heard before spoke to me like a trumpet blast. The voice said, "Come up here, and I will show you what must happen after this." ² And instantly I was in the Spirit, and I saw a throne in heaven and someone sitting on it. ³ The one sitting on the throne was as brilliant as gemstones—like jasper and carnelian. And the glow of an emerald circled his throne like a rainbow. ⁴ Twenty-four thrones surrounded him, and twenty-four elders sat on them. They were all clothed in white and had gold crowns on their heads. ⁵ From the throne came flashes of lightning and the rumble of thunder. And in front of the throne were seven torches with burning flames. This is the sevenfold Spirit of God. ⁶ In front of the throne was a shiny sea of glass, sparkling like crystal. In the center and around the throne were four living beings, each covered with eyes, front and back. ⁷ The first of these living beings was like a lion; the second was like an ox; the third had a human face; and the fourth was like an eagle in flight.
 - ⁸ Each of these living beings had six wings, and their wings were covered all over with eyes, inside and out. Day after day and night after night they keep on saying, "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord God, the Almighty— the one who always was, who is, and who is still to come."
 - ⁹ Whenever the living beings give glory and honor and thanks to the one sitting on the throne (the one who lives forever and ever), ¹⁰ **the twenty-four elders fall down and worship the one sitting on the throne** (the one who lives forever and ever). **And they lay their crowns before the throne** and say,
 - ¹¹ "You are worthy, O Lord our God, to receive glory and honor and power. For you created all things, and they **exist** because you created what you pleased." (Rev 4:1–11 NLT-SE)

WHEN WORSHIP BECOMES ABOUT SOMETHING OTHER THAN GOD

- When our worship becomes more like witchcraft (1 Samuel 14-15)
 - When **insecurity** goes unchecked.
 - When Saul comes on the scene in 1 Samuel 9, he is insecure and self-deprecating.
 - "I'm only from the tribe of Benjamin, the smallest tribe in Israel, and my family is the least important of all the families of that tribe! Why are you talking like this to me?" (1 Sam 9:21 NLT-SE)
 - This manifests itself again in chapter 14, when Jonathan had eaten honey during a time when Saul had placed his army under an oath of fasting. Saul was more willing to put Jonathan to death for his transgression than to admit his own mistake in leadership.
 - "Jonathan has won this great victory for Israel. Should he die? Far from it! As surely as the Lord lives, not one hair on his head will be touched, for God helped him do a great deed today." So the people rescued Jonathan, and he was not put to death. (1 Sam 14:45 NLT-SE)
 - **Insecurity is just another word for pride.** An insecure person is a person who is preoccupied with themselves: how they look, how they appear to others, whether or not they are accepted by their peers.
 - Many times, **insecurity is linked to perfectionism**, which is yet another word for **pride**.

Any time we are more focused on ourselves than on God and others, we run the risk of nurturing pride in our hearts.

· When fear drives our decisions.

page - 3 Week 5: Sowing Worship

- As the story in 1 Sam 13 opens, **Saul is about to go to war against the Philistines**. He wants to offer a sacrifice before they enter into battle, but after waiting 7 days, Samuel still hasn't arrived. His troops were get restless and start walking away from him.
- Saul starts sensing he is loosing the confidence of his troops and makes a fatal error. **He offers the sacrifice himself.** Out of fear, he begins to operate in a level of authority that was never meant for him.
- Fear is a lack of trust in God's leadership in our lives and a refusal to live under His authority. When we refuse
 to live our lives under God's divine authority, refusing to accept the human authorities He has placed over us, we
 are living in rebellion and our authority is weakened. In Jesus' encounter with the centurion in Matthew 8, we
 can see human authority demonstrated appropriately
 - 8 But the officer said, "Lord, I am not worthy to have you come into my home. Just say the word from where you are, and my servant will be healed. 9 I know this because I am under the authority of my superior officers, and I have authority over my soldiers. I only need to say, 'Go,' and they go, or 'Come,' and they come. And if I say to my slaves, 'Do this,' they do it." (Matt 8:8–9 NLT-SE)
- The truth is **our authority is strengthened when we choose to submit** to someone with more authority than ourselves, but this kind of submission requires trust. **Fear usually reveals a lack of trust**; At times, fear is a **refusal** to trust.

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- When disobedience becomes acceptable.
 - Throughout this story **Saul's fear and insecurity are leading him to disobey God**. Eventually, God calls him out on his **witchcraft**. The Word says that **Saul's so-called sacrifice to God was really self-worship!**
 - God sends Saul into battle against the Amalekites. In 1 Samuel 15:3, He commands Saul to "completely destroy the entire Amalekite nation—men, women, children, babies, cattle, sheep, goats, camels, and donkeys."
 - In verse 9, we see that instead of killing King Agag, Saul and his men capture the king and keep "the best of the sheep and goats, the cattle, the fat calves, and the lambs—everything, in fact, that appealed to them. They destroyed only what was worthless or of poor quality." He spares the evil King's life, keeps the best of the spoils and then in verse 13, Saul has the audacity to say to Samuel, "I have carried out the Lord's command!"
 - When Samuel confronts his disobedience, he defends himself by saying that that the things they saved back were to sacrifice to the Lord. Wrong! In fact, verse 12 says, "Early the next morning Samuel went to find Saul."
 Someone told him, "Saul went to the town of Carmel to set up a monument to himself; then he went on to Gilgal." (1 Sam 15:12 NLT-SE)
 - Saul actually sets himself up as the one to be worshipped! His glory is short lived, because Samuel receives a word from the Lord for Saul that will change his life forever...
 - ²² "What is more pleasing to the Lord: your burnt offerings and sacrifices or your obedience to his voice? Listen! Obedience is better than sacrifice, and submission is better than offering the fat of rams. ²³ Rebellion is as sinful as witchcraft, and stubbornness as bad as worshiping idols. So because you have rejected the command of the Lord, he has rejected you as king." (1 Sam 15:22–23 NLT-SE)
 - One commentator says, "Saul's life is a warning to the church of what happens when we think we can defeat the enemy outside of us without first having defeated the enemy inside of us."

The truth is, if we fail to defeat our own insecurity, fear and disobedience, we may find that our response to God is more rebellion than worship!

page - 4 Week 5: Sowing Worship

WHAT IS IT THAT WE ARE ACTUALLY SOWING?

- We are sowing biblical understanding
 - *True Worship*...is **God-Centered**. Come, let us worship and bow down. Let us kneel before the Lord our maker. (Psa 95:6 NLT-SE)
 - R.C. Sproul says, "As fallen creatures, it is one of our most basic and fundamental inclinations to worship something, or someone, other than the true God."
 - **Speak** about Him in a way that reflects His true character...Singing, shouting, declaring, prophesying, confessing, repenting, etc.
 - **Bow** before Him, physically, emotionally, and spiritually
 - Intentionally, take steps to **yield** to His will
 - **Defer** to His leadership in our lives
 - *True Worship*...is not musical, but more **positional**. We are sowing **the keys to relationship with God and each other?**
 - Are we living a life of humility? Jesus never spent time trying to convince people to follow Him. He made the
 invitation and proceeded forward. It was up to them whether or not they followed. If we sow worship, we will
 harvest humility!
 - Are we **serving**, more than wanting to be served (John 13)? An interesting shift happens with this word when we get to the epistles in the New Testament, where Paul and the others are instructing the Church. Instead of using *proskuneo*, these writers begin to use the Greek word *latreia*, which means indirect worship in the form of the spiritual service rendered to fellow humans and to God.
 - Are we open **about our faith**, or mostly silent because we're afraid of looking foolish or making a mistake? (1 Pet 3:15)
- We are sowing the promise of eternal hope
 - The past...God does not just release people from their past, with the hope of restoration, but many times releases us into our future, seeing the move forward as a creative endeavor in our lives. (Jer 29:11)
 - **The present...**Not focusing only on meeting the needs of the present, but carving out a place in our hearts for a **future with God**. (Deut 33:27, 2 Cor 5:1)
 - The future...We are preparing and equipping people *now* to embrace what will yield receive **eternal rewards** *tomorrow*. (Col 3:23-24, Heb 11:16, 1 Tim 6:17-19)
- We are sowing the power of love
 - Because God is who He says He is...change is inevitable and nothing is impossible! (Luke 18:27)
 - Because God is who He says He is...when we are weak, He is strong in and through us. (2 Cor 12:9-11)
 - Because God is who He says He is...He will never ask us to do something He will not give us the **resources**, **courage**, and **strength** to complete. **God pays for what he orders!** (Josh 13)
 - Because God is who He says He is...LOVE WINS! (James 2:13)
